

Duncan Coombs will tell you all about that, but I should perhaps mention that the RHS Lily Group is in the process of negotiating an arrangement with The Savill Garden in a joint collaboration to grow woodland lilies for trial and conservation. North of the border in Scotland our new Committee member Madeleine Tinson also opened her garden for a visit and again she will tell you

how that went, so I will move on to other matters. Our long-standing Committee member Colin Pope has decided it is time for him to stand down, a former Treasurer and stalwart on all matters financial, Colin has recently been instrumental in helping Irene Hopton-Scott sort out some problems she has had with the Membership PayPal account. We will miss his many contributions to our meetings.

As to the lilies themselves, well it has been a topsy turvy year here in Wiltshire. Many had a real check from the incessant frosts during all of April. I found constantly loading layers of leaf mould onto the emerging shoots helped to protect them from the hardest frosts. Then followed a constant deluge during May just to encourage any fungal rotting to take hold and more recently a summer blast of heat to bring everything into flowering remarkably fast. Lilium martagon, L. bansonii, L. leichtlinii subsp. maximowiczii and L. regale were all over in a few days. Lilium superbum and some of the oriental hybrids are now themselves looking superb. We look forward to more opening up and to remaining healthy for the rest of this season with the AGM and Bulb Auction full of promise for the future.

Parkhead, Perth, Scotland (Madeleine Tinson's Garden) Open weeks: June 2021

The last time the Group visited my garden was in 2015 when travel was not restricted. This visit was instigated by a suggestion that 'Events' should be offered to those of us who live 'up North', so I was delighted to welcome many back and to see some new faces.

Following a delay to normal flowering times (due to the cold weather), I suggested those who could, postpone their visit by a couple of weeks. By then most of the North Hybrids were flowering on mass in my greenhouses, along with *Cardiocrinum*, martagons, *Lilium monadelphum* and *Nomocharis*, flowering in the borders.

The Savill Garden, Windsor: 17 July

A small group of members were welcomed to The Savill Garden by the Keeper of the Gardens, John Anderson who led us on a tour pointing out where their current *Lilium* collection grew and several other areas suitable for growing lilies, where he would like to see many more planted. Amongst the lilies we saw were *Lilium martagon*, *L. lankongense*, *L. duchartreri*, *L. regale* and *L.* 'Bellingham Hybrid'. Chairman Dr James Compton thanked our host for giving us a more personalised (and extended) tour and hoped that in the future the Lily Group would be able to help The Savill Garden extend its range and number of *Lilium* species.

Dorothy Clive Garden, Shropshire: 12 August

A select group of members travelled to south Shropshire to visit the Dorothy Clive Garden. Despite a noticeable lack of lilies, this garden, built around an old stone quarry, was still a wonderful place to gain inspiration. They could certainly grow lilies in the dappled shade of mature oak and beech trees.

The group were treated to a guided tour by two volunteer guides and later had a chance to exchange stories and information over our informal lunch. Considering our recent weather, we were fortunate that the sun shone through most of the day.

2021 Lily Group AGM



Online via Zoom | Saturday 16 October | 2pm BST

Our AGM has a silver lining – Covid may prevent us meeting in person but many more of us can participate via Zoom, in the UK, Europe and beyond.

Zoom allows The Lily Group to offer a highly topical presentation to gardeners in this period of climate change. It is also an opportunity for members and the committee to meet and get to know each other better.

Firstly, however, you need to know that your committee has agreed an updated Constitution to reflect our independent status from the RHS. We will be circulating this to all our members and you will be able to vote on it at the AGM.

Two new members have joined our committee during the past twelve months: Chris Clennett who now edits our biannual Newsletter; and Madeleine Tinson who is taking a lead on lily conservation and collections. You will be able to meet Chris and Madeleine at the AGM.

Our presentation is by Jim Marshall who will look at 'Suitable Alternatives to Peat'. Jim is Vice Chairman of the RHS Herbaceous Committee and a Gardens Adviser to the

National Trust. With an impending ban on the sale of peat in the UK as a result of its importance in storage of CO₂, Jim will tell us about the trial he led into 'Peat Free Growing Media' and the encouraging results obtained. Then followed by your chance to ask questions.

This year's recipient of the Lyttel Lily Cup is Martin Toon (see page 6). Martin is an outstanding grower of species lilies who gardens in South Island, New Zealand. We will be showing you something of Martin's achievements as a lily grower.

You will also be able to vote on whether to renew the term of those members of committee whose period in office is expiring. Lyttel Cup 2021

It is with much pleasure that the committee of the RHS Lily Group have unanimously decided to award this year's Lyttel Cup to Martin Toon of Christchurch, New Zealand.



Martin, who joined the Group in 2011, is an extremely successful grower of a very wide range of *Lilium* species (well over 100 species, subspecies, varieties and forms) who takes full advantage of the temperate climate of his South Island home.

A quick search of recent Lily Group seed lists reveals just how good a grower Martin Toon is and also how incredibly generous he has been in sharing his success with other members. His contributions over the last few years have included the very beautiful but tricky to grow *L. parryi* and *L. bumboldtii* subsp. ocellatum; the scarce and sought-after *L. grayi*, *L. maritimum*, *L. occidentale* and *L. kelleyanum*; not to mention the extremely rare and precious *L. fargesii*, *L. matangense*, *L. papilliferum* and the plant currently in cultivation as

Lilium majoense. Martin has also distributed seed of a very interesting lily, grown by him from a 2016 Lily Group seed lot, which may possibly be a 'new' and as yet undescribed species. In addition, Martin has been a regular contributor to both the New Zealand Lily Society and the North American Lily Society seed exchanges.

Researchers in the United States and here in the United Kingdom are currently employing a DNA-based study to investigate relationships within *Lilium*. The Lily Group have been helping with this and material Martin has been able to provide from his extensive collection has helped enormously.

The NZLS is fortunate to benefit from the very generous way Martin gives his time and energy to promote and support all of their activities, something his father did before him. The Lily Group and the wider world of 'lilyophiles' are greatly indebted to him for doing so much to maintain *Lilium* species stocks in cultivation and to encourage the growing of all kinds of lilies in New Zealand and across the world.

GETTING HACKED & GETTING CLEAN

Many Lily Group members find lilies addictive. If you have 'Googled' our website recently, search results included adverts for tramadol and other pain killers.

We'd been hacked! A message in Russian confirmed this, apparently advertising a site on the 'dark net'. How could this happen? Well, I now understand that hackers use an automated software algorithm to 'guess' the password of a website administrator (by entering thousands of options per minute).

The Lily Group website has two administrators so one of us had our password rumbled. The first signs were of strange drug-related messages appearing on random pages. After initially removing these intrusions the hackers posted more and more messages – and then infected our Google search results to promote pain killers. As a result, and after seeking professional help, we moved the website to a

more secure server – reminding us all to be far more security conscious.

The process of ensuring that the website and our computers/devices are free from malware involves taking several steps which are worth sharing here:

ANTIVIRUS CHECKLIST KEEP YOUR DEVICE(S) FREE FROM VIRUSES

- ▲ To check whether your device is free from viruses visit: https://www.malwarebytes.com
 Compatible with Android, iOS, Windows or Mac OS.
 Infected files are 'quarantined' and can be deleted.
- Scan your device(s) regularly. Install the 'Premium' version of malwarebytes to automate the process.
- A Remove stored cookies and 'cached' files with CCleaner from: https://www.ccleaner.com/.
 Free and 'premium' versions are available.
- Always have up-to-date antivirus software installed. There is a wide range of choice including Avast, AVG, Kaspersky and McAfee.

RHS Lily Group Finding us on Facebook

Bjørnar Olsen has written articles for *Lilies and Related Plants* and is very knowledgeable about *Lilium* species in Yunnan and Szechuan. In 2015 he set up the Species *Lilium* and *Nomocharis* Enthusiasts Group on Facebook. Currently, it has 1,600 members. If I were asked to name one source that convinced me of the benefits of using social media to encourage and share information about *Lilium*, it would be the Group set up by Bjørnar. One of the problems with reference books about *Lilium* is that once the information is committed to paper it cannot evolve. Using social media introduces a flexibility that can refer to, extend and update the information contained in reference books.

When I was editor of *Lilies and Related Plants* the subject of the Lily Group using social media was regularly discussed at Lily Group meetings. It was felt that using social media would enable

the Lily Group to make its purpose and *Lilium* related activities better known and attract new members. I, of course, fully endorsed the use of social media, citing the example of Bjørnar Olsen's Facebook page. Then time passed, I stepped down as editor of *Lilies and Related Plants* after 10 years. Mel Herbert became the

editor and emailed me to ask me to set up a page on Facebook for the Lily Group. I did this in July 2020. Aware that some people are apprehensive about sharing their personal details on social media, I made the Group a private group, where only members can see who is in the Group and what they Post. There are over 400 members of the RHS Lily Group Facebook page and membership continues to grow.

Members of the Lily Group, reading this piece, might be asking, 'How can I contribute to the RHS Lily Group Facebook page and encourage people to join the Lily Group?' The answer to that question is straightforward. The first thing to do, if you are not already a member, is to join Facebook. Then ask to join the RHS Lily Group Facebook page. As an Administrator of the Group I will accept your request and you will then become a member. As a member, you will be able to post information and photographs of *Lilium* and, subtly, extol the virtues of being a member of the Lily Group and thereby encourage people to join.
