Over the years I've used this editorial slot to try to set out the case for plant societies. Sometimes I've taken a plant-based approach: plant societies are extraordinary funds of knowledge about garden plants, I've pointed out, and they help to disseminate rare and unusual plants, foster

interest in them and even play their part in introducing new ones. Sometimes I've taken a people-based approach: the internet does many things surpassingly well, I've argued, but people need people, not screens, and in this technological age we should cherish more than ever organisations that bring people together.

Stirring stuff, you'll agree. But I've been cognisant in making these pleas that I'm somewhat preaching to the choir. The people who read the editorials are exactly those who are most predisposed to be persuaded by the arguments they present. Such echo-chamberism, though it can raise the spirits, actually does little towards achieving objectives.

The other thought that occurs is the troubling one that if it is necessary to make the case for something, then there must also exist a corresponding negative view of that thing that is being countered.

After all, no one feels the need to make a case for something that is thriving, well-supported and under no threat. And it is hard not to conclude that plant societies are very much under threat at present.

Not all, perhaps, but certainly many.

Memberships are tumbling and discord and dissatisfaction are rife. It feels like a crisis point is nearing and the time for







RHS Plant Trials

The RHS trials a wide range of ornamental and edible plants to test their performance. The best are recommended for the prestigious RHS Award of Garden Merit (AGM). The award is the RHS seal of approval for plants that perform reliably in the garden, and the logo often appears on plant labels and in nursery catalogues.

The trials enable multiple selections of the same plant to be grown side by side under the same conditions so they can be compared. Trials are assessed by a panel of judges and the results are ratified by the relevant RHS Expert Group to decide which plants should receive an AGM, and if any current AGMs should be removed. An AGM can also be awarded by round-table assessment or rolling review.

Trials at RHS Garden Wisley are held in a purpose-built Trials Garden and Edible Trials area. This has been joined by a permanent trials area at RHS Garden Bridgewater. The RHS also holds



trials at gardens and nurseries across the UK, including the three other RHS gardens, and at RHS partner gardens. Sometimes trials are duplicated across more than one site to investigate the impact of climate differences. Visitors are welcome to visit the trials

at RHS gardens. In addition, many of the other locations are open to visitors or have public open days.

RHS Expert Groups

RHS Expert Groups provide a valuable source of horticultural expertise, with members from the amateur, professional and commercial sectors. They voluntarily commit their time to act as RHS ambassadors, helping us to:

- Advance the knowledge and understanding of horticultural and sustainable growing practices.
- Extend our regional, national and international networks.
- Share the best in gardening with RHS members and the wider gardening public.
- Help to open up gardening to beginners, young people and urban dwellers.

Some of the ways in which all our Expert Groups do this are:

- Deliver outreach activities to a wide audience, such as providing advice at RHS shows, visiting relevant gardens (including RHS gardens), nurseries and community groups.
- Input into activities at RHS shows,

- gardens and events to promote horticulture and engage more people in gardening.
- Help build horticulture for the future by promoting and enabling opportunities for careers in horticulture through active engagement with students at all levels.
- Submit proposals for plant trials, make recommendations for trials and the structure of relevant assessment forums.
- Coordinate rolling reviews of the relevant Award of Garden Merit list for gardenworthy plants.
- Liaise with the Science and Collections Guidance and Oversight Group where appropriate, including assisting with support for trials output.
- Assess, recommend and ratify plants for award where appropriate, including RHS Chelsea Plant of the Year.
- Assist with website content, publications, trials reports and other areas.
- Recognise those who have made an outstanding contribution to the practice and promotion of horticulture through the RHS People Awards.

Alpine & Rock Garden Expert Group

Formed in 1936 as the Joint Rock Garden Plant Committee, the Group consists of experts in these specialised plants and their diverse growing conditions. As well as its own meetings, the Group attends Alpine Garden Society and Scottish Rock Garden Club events all over the UK, judging and assessing rock garden and alpine plants for RHS plant awards, including the Award of Garden Merit.

Bulb Expert Group

The Group evolved in 2013 from the Daffodil & Tulip Committee, which was formed in 1884. Its wider remit now covers plants with bulbs and other subterranean storage organs, including corms, tubers and rhizomes. Its members also contribute to the production of the *Daffodil, Snowdrop & Tulip Yearbook* and help to organise and judge relevant plants at regional horticultural shows and competitions. The Group has strong links internationally, particularly in the Netherlands. The RHS is the International Cultivar Registration Authority for daffodils and lilies.

Fruit, Vegetable & Herb Expert Group

Formed in 1858, this is the oldest Expert Group. Its members assist with the judging of fruit, vegetable and herb classes at horticultural competitions and shows and participate in cultivar identification at various locations. They also visit allotment sites in the UK to share their knowledge and contribute expertise to RHS apps and campaigns.

Herbaceous Plant Expert Group

The Group, formed in 1859 as the Floral Committee and renamed in 2005, has a huge remit covering hardy herbaceous perennials including carnations and pinks, chrysanthemums, delphiniums and grasses. Its members regularly contribute to many RHS trials and rolling reviews of

the Award of Garden Merit. They give demonstrations and talks at a variety of shows and events across the country. The RHS is the International Cultivar Registration Authority for *Dahlia*, *Delphinium* and *Dianthus*.

Orchid Expert Group

The Group was formed in 1889 and holds meetings around the country, working with local orchid societies and assessing more than 200 orchids for RHS plant awards every year. It has strong international links and its members represent the Group and the RHS at events all over the world. The Group assists in the planning and delivery of the annual RHS Orchid Show. The RHS is also the International Cultivar Registration Authority for orchid hybrids.

The RHS makes some changes to its Expert Group membership each year to ensure they remain relevant, vibrant and diverse. Tender Ornamental Expert Group

Formed in 1963 and renamed in 2005, the Group comprises experts in growing tender plants from around the world, which, in temperate climates, are normally grown under protection or as houseplants. Its annual programme of events includes talks and demonstrations at a variety of flower shows, along with visiting nurseries and gardens where the members can share their expertise and learn about new technology.

Woody Expert Group

Formed in 1859 as part of the Floral Committee and renamed in 2005, the Group is the source of expertise for hardy trees and shrubs, including old hybrid roses, rose species and hardy climbing plants. It makes study visits to important collections and has links with the International Dendrology Society and other societies, and membership includes representatives from the RHS Rhododendron, Camellia & Magnolia Group. The RHS is the International Cultivar Registration Authority for Clematis, conifers and Rhododendron.



RHS Horticultural Bursaries – start your adventure

The RHS offers a range of bursaries for projects, expeditions and other activities related to horticulture. These might include a voluntary work placement in a leading botanic or historic garden, an expedition or study tour to see plants in their native habitat, or attending a horticultural conference or symposium. In fact, any project, visit or study tour with a clear relevance to horticulture could be eligible.

Apply for a bursary

Anyone, from knowledgeable amateur gardeners to botanical artists, soil scientists, arboriculturists and those working in plant nurseries can apply for a bursary, provided certain criteria are met.

Following completion of a bursarysupported project, each recipient is requested to write a brief report on their experience. These are accessible to the public through RHS Libraries, ensuring that the knowledge gained is then spread throughout the horticultural community.

More than £150,000 is awarded in bursaries by the RHS each year. This is thanks to charitable donations and bequests from benefactors wishing to further the interests of horticultural education.
